

# The SAT® and SAT Subject Tests™

## Fee Waiver Checklist

### 1 Get a Fee Waiver

- Talk to your school counselor or your local community-based organization to get a fee waiver.
- Know the eligibility requirements. Find them at [sat.org/fee-waivers](https://sat.org/fee-waivers).

### 2 Register for the SAT® and SAT Subject Tests™

- Register with your fee waiver either online or by mail. If you need access to a computer or the internet, see your school counselor or visit a local Boys & Girls Club for a safe place to study with support from trained staff. Visit [bgca.org](https://bgca.org) to find a local club.
- Indicate that you're paying with a fee waiver, and enter the entire 12-digit code. Once you've registered with a fee waiver, you won't need to use a new fee waiver code to register online for future tests. Fee waiver benefits will be automatically added to your College Board account. If you are registering by paper, you'll always need to enclose the completed card in the envelope. (Incomplete cards will be returned unprocessed.)
- Use your unlimited score reports to send your scores to colleges for free, at any time in high school.
- During registration, order either the **Question-and-Answer Service (QAS)** or the **Student Answer Service (SAS)** for the SAT.
- Also during registration, sign up for **Student Search Service®**, a program that connects you with college and scholarship opportunities. Learn more at [sat.org/studentsearch](https://sat.org/studentsearch).

### 3 Get Ready for the Test

- Create your own personalized SAT study plan.
- Prepare for the SAT with free, personalized, and official SAT practice at [satpractice.org](https://satpractice.org). For a paper-and-pencil experience, review *The SAT Student Guide* and ask your counselor for a full-length practice test.
- Did you take the PSAT/NMSQT®? Sign in to [studentscores.collegeboard.org](https://studentscores.collegeboard.org). You can link your results to get personalized practice recommendations and use SAT Skills Insight™ to help boost your skills in challenging areas.
- Visit [satsubjecttests.org/practice](https://satsubjecttests.org/practice) to prepare for the SAT Subject Tests.

### 4 Prepare for College

- Create your own pledge to attend college.
- Make a college plan, find the right college, and learn how to apply and pay for it at **BigFuture™** ([bigfuture.org](https://bigfuture.org)). Don't let worries about tuition cost or grades hold you back. Most colleges offer financial aid.
- Register with **CSS Profile™** to apply for financial aid ([cssprofile.collegeboard.org](https://cssprofile.collegeboard.org)).
- Apply to colleges with your college application fee waiver forms (delivered directly to your online account at the beginning of your senior year).
